Theme: Sport, Health and Social Inclusion



Desired Outcomes

- A more physically active, and healthy community.
- Enhanced pathways for elite athletes, including First Nations and people with disability.
- Improved equity within and between our regions.
- Increased inclusion and accessibility for vulnerable or marginalised communities.
- Stronger gender equity, increasing the attraction, enablement and retention of women in sport.

Some of the ideas we have heard so far through the community engagement process:

Sport for Every Child

School and community sport funded to allow every child to participate at least once a week.

Oceania of Sport

Building pathways for community and elite athlete participation across the Oceania region - including coaching, mentoring, scholarship and inspiration.

Paralympic Centre of Excellence

A training, athlete development and accreditation facility to enhance research and participation for all athletes with disability.

Volunteer Passport

Build the volunteering culture, skills and capacity to deliver a great games and grow volunteers in sport and community activities.

Indigenous Excellence in Sport

An innovative program that attracts and develops First Nations athletes across Queensland, Australia and Oceania.

Sporting Futures Fund + Regional Sporting Hubs

Enable community clubs to access the training and resources they need for athletes to remain in their home regions - for the benefit of both the athlete and their community.

Olympic and Paralympic Housing Trust

Explore potential for using the athletes' villages across the region to help address affordable housing supply.

Elite Athlete Pathway Program

Support for high performance athletes at every stage of their career.

Out of the listed focus areas, inclusive, affordable housing is essential to Brisbane 2032 legacy planning and impacts all other areas. Practical steps to increase supply may include:

- Collaborate with accommodation partners, including industry associations and organisations representing hotels, resident managers, caravan parks, and other short-stay providers to ensure adequate supply of accommodation options for visitors and sufficient rooms during the Games, negotiating agreements that prioritise visitors and temporary workers.
- Foster public-private partnerships between all levels of government, the private sector, and tourism and housing industry stakeholders to jointly invest in projects catering to workforce housing needs, e.g. complexes near major event venues or establishing housing cooperatives.
- Temporary or modular solutions there may be opportunities to work with innovative, sustainable organisations to produce cost-effective, high-quality housing options that support commitments to a circular economy. Any structures can be utilised during the event and repurposed afterwards.
- Repurpose existing housing infrastructure by converting unused or underutilised buildings (including vacant office spaces or residential properties) into temporary Brisbane 2032 accommodation.
- Review and adapt regulatory frameworks to facilitate development of affordable housing options and streamline approval processes, taking a long-term view to addressing housing shortages.
- Prioritise community engagement to ensure any initiatives are aligned with local contexts and address specific community requirements.



Theme: A better future for our environment



Desired Outcomes

- Climate Positive Games leads to a climate positive Queensland.
- Regenerating and caring for Country.
- Combining ancient wisdom with emerging science and technology.
- Changing behaviour to improve environmental outcomes.
- Accelerating renewable energy.

Some of the ideas we have heard so far through the community engagement process:

Legacy Forests

Enhance biodiversity, reduce carbon and cool the Earth by investing in an Olympic forest or planting a tree for every ticket sold.

Zero Waste to Landfill by 2032

Support a low carbon, circular economy through the introduction of enhanced waste management and material passports for all new venues and infrastructures.

Biodiversity Credits

Develop a state wide trading scheme to allow corporates to invest in the protection and regeneration of our most special natural places.

Water Sensitive Regions

Protect and restore water bodies across our cities and regions to enhance our blue ecosystem.

Most Sustainable Venues

Our Olympic and Paralympic venues have the smallest environmental footprint possible, and sustainable economic and social legacies.

2042 Living Environment "Museum"

A natural history museum without walls - created by packaging the most iconic natural places in Queensland into a singular online and lived experience.

Introduce Environmental Science to School Curriculum

Mandatory education for all children in Queensland to enable a culture of environmental responsibility.

All focus areas are of equal importance.

- Develop and implement sustainable infrastructure requirements for venues, accommodation, and transportation systems. This includes incorporating renewable energy sources, energy-efficient designs, passive cooling/heating, and eco-friendly construction materials.
- Prioritise investment in transportation options such as public transit, cycling/micromobility infrastructure, and pedestrian paths. Develop efficient transportation plans to minimise congestion and emissions to ensure long-term benefit for residents.
- Foster partnerships between environmental organisations, communities, research institutions and businesses to drive innovation and create sustainable solutions tailored to local needs.
- Set an 80% procurement target from Queensland-based suppliers, manufacturers, and service providers, with preference to those who prioritise sustainability, have relevant certifications, or directly benefit local communities through circular economy initiatives and job creation.
- Establish a comprehensive policy framework for sustainability, including clear targets for carbon reduction, waste management, water conservation, and biodiversity protection.
- Continuation/extension of grant programs and tax incentives to encourage tourism businesses to adopt sustainable/circular economy practices, i.e., resource recovery (onsite plastic recycling), renewable energy, water management (water tanks, greywater systems) and waste management infrastructure (solar auto-sorting rubbish bins, largescale composting facilities).
- Launch education and awareness campaigns to inform the public, businesses, suppliers, and visitors about the importance of sustainable practices, water-saving measures, and biodiversity protection by encouraging responsible practices and highlighting success stories.
- Develop a platform for comprehensive visitor economy long-term planning and reporting for environmental sustainability beyond the Brisbane 2032, including milestones, progress monitoring, and transparent reporting on initiatives and outcomes.
- A review of the current *Queensland Zero Emission Vehicle Rebate Scheme*, incentive, and eligibility criteria to include a broader range of vehicles and support the transition to electric fleets for the tour and transport sector.
- Explore potential for installing community batteries in regions that are heavily reliant on tourism to support industry energy needs.



Theme: Connecting Regionally and Globally



Desired Outcomes

- A region that is connected culturally, linguistically and environmentally.
- Improved transport and digital connectivity.
- Urban renewal delivers more great precincts and places that support future liveability, community spirit and connectedness.
- A stronger global identity.

Some of the ideas we have heard so far through the community engagement process:

Oceania "Song Line"

A digital storytelling collection and tourism initiative to connect the story and cultures of First Nations peoples across Oceania.

Make Walking or Wheeling Easy and Enjoyable

Develop dedicated, safe and engaging pedestrian networks connecting venues and precincts locally and region-wide.

Deliver Great Local Places and Precincts that Connect Communities

Invest in creating vibrant places and precincts in our cities, towns and regional areas.

First Nations Cultural "Experience"

An iconic building that tells the stories of the world's oldest living cultures, in their own way. A place for truthtelling, truth-hearing, creativity and cultural expression.

A Future-Fit Transport System for South East Queensland

Enhanced and inclusive mass transit solution that unlocks other legacy benefits for South East Queensland.

First Nations Language and Culture

Celebrate the local languages through signage, naming conventions, stories, school curriculum and the Opening Ceremony.

Develop Digital Solutions that Create Regional Opportunities

Invest in digital infrastructure and partnerships to enhance equity and accelerate economic outcomes.

Universal Access

All Olympic and Paralympic venues, precincts, live sites and infrastructure are accessible to everyone.

- Invest in cultural exchange programs, festivals, and events that promote the diverse heritage and cultural identity of Queensland.
- Integration of a First Nations-led media hub to ensure recognition of First Nations cultures is embedded in all Brisbane 2032 coverage.
- Support language training initiatives to enhance communication between visitors and locals, fostering a welcoming and inclusive environment.
- Invest in digital infrastructure and broadband connectivity to ensure seamless communication and internet access for tourists and businesses.
- Ongoing investment in appropriate catalytic infrastructure and transport systems to fully capitalise on emerging opportunities.
- Develop accessible and pedestrian-friendly infrastructure and micromobility-friendly streetscapes, to promote walkable cities and encourage active transportation.
- Implement urban renewal projects that revitalise key areas, creating attractive precincts and public spaces that enhance liveability, community spirit, connectedness, and ease of movement.
- Foster public-private partnerships to develop sustainable, mixed-use precincts that integrate residential, commercial, cultural, and recreational facilities.
- Encourage the development of innovative and environmentally friendly infrastructure, such as green buildings, parks, and pedestrian-friendly zones, to create vibrant and walkable urban environments. This could include expedited tree planting to provide shade and protection along roads/walkways. Direct sun/heat and rain prevents people from walking between locations.

- Adding tourism roles to the skills shortage list, to encourage experienced personnel from overseas to pursue opportunities in Australia.
- Work with the Federal Government and insurers to address the affordability and availability of commercial and public liability insurance for tourism-related businesses to ensure long-term industry viability.
- Encourage diversity and inclusion in the workforce by implementing programs that support underrepresented groups in accessing tourism-related employment opportunities, including employer guidance on creating inclusive workplace cultures.
- Foster collaboration between industry, government, and research institutions to drive innovation, knowledge exchange, and research and development initiatives.
- Ongoing promotion of the high standards of Australian qualifications and the qualifications framework, strengthened by linkages with industry and directly related outcomes to address critical skills shortages and meet Brisbane 2032 demand.
- Establish tourism-specific incubation programs and innovation hubs that foster entrepreneurship and support the development of new businesses and startups.
- Promote technology adoption and digital transformation within the tourism industry, offering training and resources to assist businesses in leveraging digital platforms and tools for enhanced operations and marketing.
- Develop targeted investment attraction strategies to encourage domestic and international investors to invest in Queensland's tourism industry, supporting infrastructure development, and business growth.
- Provide industry stakeholders with access to relevant market research, data insights and forecasts, empowering businesses to make informed decisions and adapt their strategies.
