Growing up in the Gold Coast, Kerryn served as the General Manager for Cook Islands Tourism from 2011-2016 and was instrumental in the awareness and increase of the Cook Islands for the Australian market.

She was the President of the tourism board association, Treasures of the South Pacific that was charged with working collaboratively with smaller South Pacific Islands to market their destinations throughout Australia.

Prior to this, she was the Vice President Product for Qantas Vacations (now Helloworld) based in Los Angeles from 1999-2006.
